On Saturday 6th May Janet Neilson, a member at Uniting Church Sketty flew through the skies at 100mph to raise money for Muscular Dystrophy UK.

Janet was attached to Europe's longest zip line stretching over a mile long and 500 ft above the slate quarry and reservoir at Penrhyn, Bethesda, North Wales.

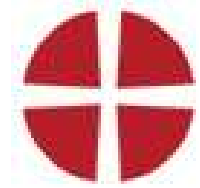

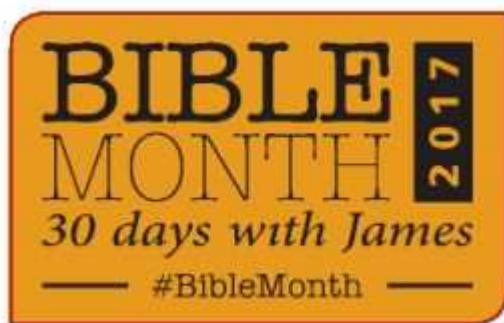

Message from the Superintendent



Welcome to the Summer edition of Connect which is full of interesting information concerning the work of the Methodist Church here in Swansea and throughout the connexion.



The Methodist Church has designated this month (June 2017) as a special Bible month when churches and circuits throughout the UK will be concentrating on the New Testament book of James.

Why James? Well it's a short, snappy and challenging book full of wisdom about how to best live as a follower of Jesus. It's also a letter that has a lot to say to us about holiness and justice which has been the theme that the President and Vice President of the Methodist Conference have promoted this past year. For the author of James, holiness without just living is an impossibility – 'faith without works is dead' (James 2 v 26).

The verse 'faith without works is dead' has sometimes been taken out of context in an attempt to create a works-based system of righteousness. James is not saying that our works make us righteous before God, but he is making it clear that real saving faith is demonstrated by good works. Works are not the cause but the evidence of salvation. James challenges us as followers of Jesus to live out our faith, demonstrating it by good deeds.

This magazine is full of stories of Christians getting involved in their local communities and going the extra mile, be that raising money for charity, supporting the homeless or digging a garden. Every day we are given the opportunity to put our faith into practice and love our neighbour. Our father in God John Wesley wrote 'Do all the good you can by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can for as long as ever you can.'

I commend Bible month to you and encourage you to get involved whenever and wherever you can. I know it will be a real blessing for us all.

I want to close my message by paying tribute to Rev Peter Dolling and Mr Bernard Gwyther who have both passed away recently and are now with the Lord.

Peter began his ministry as a missionary in the Church of South India where he was responsible for 70 churches scattered over a 30 mile radius of Tamil Nadu. He returned to the UK and served in many different circuits including Swansea and Gower in the early 80's. Ably supported by his wife Pauline, Peter had a very powerful preaching and pastoral ministry. They retired to live in Penclawdd in 1997 and played a full and active part in the life of our Reynoldston chapel.

Bernard was a member of our Mumbles church since the early 60's and was church treasurer for 30+ years as well as serving as church steward on four occasions. He served as a circuit steward in the 1980's and circuit treasurer from 2011.

The contribution that both men have made to our church has been immense. We give God thanks for their lives and ministry amongst us. May they rest in peace and rise in glory.

IT IS OVER

Just before Christmas I decided to do a tandem sky dive from Fairwood, in aid of Muscular Dystrophy UK, in memory of my mother. I set up a Just Giving page on Facebook and money started to roll in.

About six weeks before I was due to do the sky dive I phoned the airport. Strange, they had no record of me being signed in to do the sky dive on February 26th. I should have made an appointment to meet the chief flying instructor to be passed to do a safe landing before I started fund raising. Straight away I went to the airport, met the instructor and failed the safe landing test! My leg muscles were too weak for me to raise them high enough to ensure a safe landing. He gave me muscle strengthening exercises to do and asked me to return. I did the exercises for three weeks. Time was really running out by now. I returned to the airport, met the instructor and failed the test again. He told me to continue doing them and return in three months. I was absolutely gutted! I drove home in a daze. What was the point in doing the exercises for another three months if I was going to fail again?



I knew that MD UK was organising for groups to do a zip wire in North Wales in May. I had to do something as people were sponsoring me. Some had donated anonymously so I couldn't

contact them to ask if they wanted their money returned. The zip wire was for the same charity. All the people I was able to contact agreed I could keep the money. PHEW!!! I enrolled to do the zip wire. It appeared that no medical checks were necessary.

Money continued to roll
in.....BUT.....

Why did I do it?

I must have been mad, because I really didn't enjoy it at all! I suppose I could have done another sponsored event, such as going to various cafes to test out their cream teas. But then I would have had to do a sponsored walk to help lose all the weight I would have gained.

I could do the zip wire, I thought, but I really didn't think it through carefully enough.

It didn't help that my harness needed adjusting. I stood on the edge of the step, my harness was adjusted. I lay horizontally, hanging in mid air....my harness wasn't right. I stood up and it was re-adjusted. This happened four times. Eventually I set off, with a man who also lived in Swansea. He had been kept waiting, hanging in mid air, whilst my harness was adjusted! And, suddenly, it was all over. The eagle had landed. I then had to be unhooked. I grabbed the pole which was held at the other end by one of the helpers, to steady me. Another helper tried to unhook me. That pole didn't work. He got a longer pole, that didn't work. He got the longest pole. That worked after some effort. All this time I was hanging horizontally!

Eventually my feet touched the ground. They unhooked me and I had to make my way down a hill of slippery pieces of old slate, back to the reception area. The camera on my helmet which filmed my descent was taken off and I was handed a memory card. I took off the harness and suit and off I set back to the car.

The following day I arrived home. Eager to see the video of my descent, I put the memory card into my computer.....nothing.....just a black screen. Oh no, I thought, the man from Swansea didn't turn on the camera properly for me. With the memory card was another tiny memory card, but it wouldn't fit any of the equipment I had at home.

The next day I took both cards to Colliers photographic shop in the Uplands. If anyone could do anything Neil was the man.

When I returned the following day there was the video on his screen. The tiny memory card fitted into the larger memory/reader card! How was I to know that, without any instructions?

Anyway, all's well that ends well. I have raised nearly £4,000 for research into Facioscapulohumeral Muscular Dystrophy thanks to the generosity of many people in Uniting Church Sketty and our circuit, my family, former pupils from Parkland, girls I was in Glanmor with and other friends. I raised about £1,000 for each 30 seconds I was in the air.

Engaging with the Easter Story through film and play

In Sketty in the weeks just before and just after Easter, we had the opportunity to engage with the Easter Story in ways that made us think, that moved us, and brought us to discussion. It's always a positive thing, when stories which are so familiar that they can lose their impact on us, can be brought to us in new ways.

- A group of us went to see the *Son of Man* play at the Dylan Thomas theatre. When this was first released on the BBC many many years ago, it was, we learnt, very controversial. So we took the opportunity to go to the play and make up our own minds! In the group, there were mixed reactions: although we all enjoyed it, some found it more moving and stimulating than others. Certainly the dialogues given by Jesus were powerful (if somewhat long!). Generally however, we failed to see why it was so controversial – we were told that some churches in Swansea had been told by their leaders not to go and see it. This we failed to understand!
- A group of us watched the film *Risen*, and then had an opportunity to discuss it in our Reel to Real group. The film, released last year, was made from the point of view of a Roman soldier, and shot in locations to make it look like first century Palestine. Again, as you would expect, there were mixed reactions to the film, but as always, the discussion that followed helped us to consider more closely how we view the life and ministry of Jesus, and in particular his life and death.

Mumbles Lifeboat Crew who lost their lives in the 1947 disaster



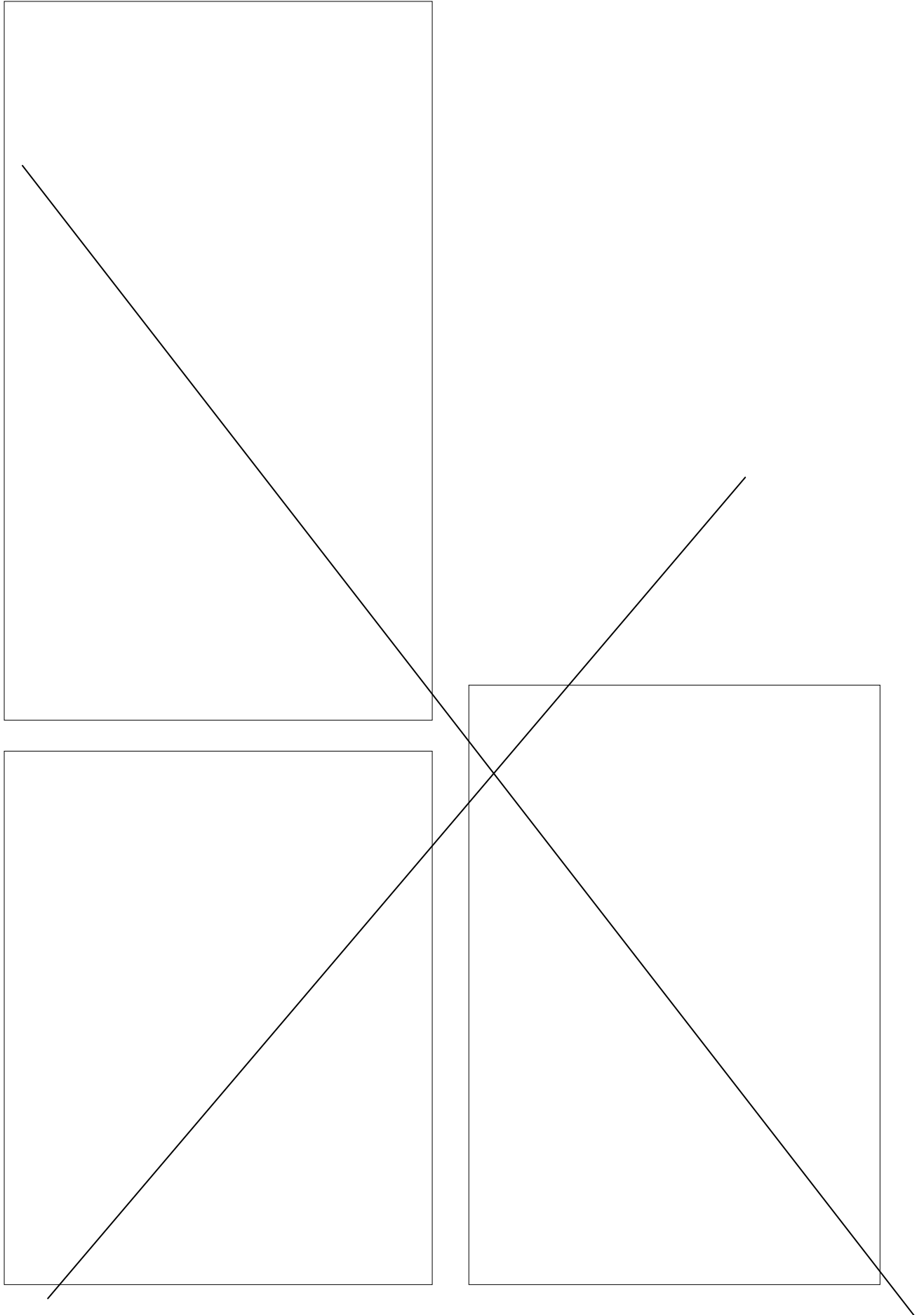

Sing To Your Heart's Content

How do we relate to "singing"? Some folks may answer, "I can't sing for toffee", or perhaps, "I'm not able to sing even one note", or maybe "I can't keep in tune"!

All of these comments may be true, but what a delight to hear someone who can really sing! It uplifts the spirit, can be soothing to the ear, a real spiritual blessing to the soul, or really very evocative, bringing back many memories! A "trained singer" can be just wonderful to listen to, but even if not "trained", music can come "straight from the heart", and "touch" people in so many ways! We mustn't forget venues the World over who hold concerts, etc. and the singing just "raises the roof" at times (not literally of course)!

Unaccompanied singing can be very enthralling, and of course, accompanied by a musical instrument or even an orchestra can be equally overwhelmingly beautiful to listen to!



How about "Birdsong". Surely there can be nothing sweeter ever heard than that of the "Nightingale's song"? Or waking up in the morning to garden birds trilling out their tunes! Our God of miracles not only formed us humans, but also surrounded us with such marvellous nature!

And what about the "skirl of the pipes" in a "Pipe Band", with kilts swinging as they march along. Wonderful! At least to some ears! Then there's The Salvation Army Bands! Amazing music sounds forth from their instruments! Also, lots of folks enjoy listening to "Brass Bands". They always create such a stirring sound to the ear! I could go on and on about all types of music – not enough space here, I'm afraid!



I'm sure there will have been thousands, if not millions of "music scores" produced by composers, etc. over the centuries. However, I would just like to comment here about "Hymn Books" in particular, containing so many wonderful hymns, written by some equally wonderful hymn-writers, not forgetting "composers of the tunes"! I've come to love and respect many of these well-loved hymns over the years! As in concert halls, etc. congregations in churches the World over also "make a joyful noise to the Lord" through their wonderful singing!

The first Hymn book I ever sung from in the congregation of the Church of Scotland, situated in the village of Dreghorn, Ayrshire, where I grew up, was "The Church of Scotland Hymn Book". I don't know when this was first published, but definitely very many years ago, before the 1940s.

When I became a member of the Church of the Nazarene in Irvine, Ayrshire, in 1960, their current hymn book was "Redemption Hymnal, published 1951, revised 1955, and re-printed in 1958, and again as recently as 2015. I was very impressed by this hymn book, so much so that the Pastor at that time went to the trouble of going to Glasgow to procure a "music edition" for me! How I loved to play hymns from that hymn book, and to this day, still do! The "flyleaf" states: *"To Irene on her 17th birthday, 19th August 1951, From Mum and Dad with love!"* What a precious possession of mine, along of course with my "upright" piano, sacrificially purchased for me by my parents when I was just 10 years old, brand new from the "Co-op"! When I came to live in Wales in 1970, after my marriage to Doug (my Welsh Husband) on 4th July 1970, I was eventually able to have my piano transported to my home here in Morriston, Swansea. What an exciting and wonderful occasion that was!

Am I digressing? Perhaps so, and I apologise, but let me just tell you a bit about some more wonderful hymn books in my possession. I have a copy of "Glorious Gospel Hymns, published 1931 by Nazarene Publishing House, Kansas City, U.S.A. Also, "Sacred Songs and Solos"

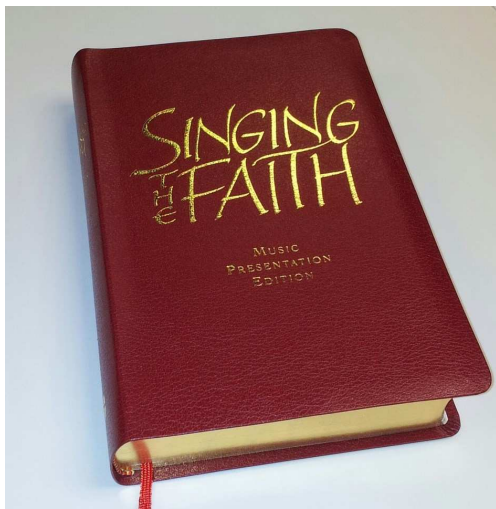

compiled under the direction of Ira D. Sankey, the one-time great sacred songs' singer. Mr. Sankey would sing all the "old time favourites", while his friend D.L. Moody would preach at all their wonderful conventions, etc. On the flyleaf of this particular hymn book are the words *"May The Giver And The Receiver Meet in Heaven"*. What a beautiful inscription, don't you think? This book was given to my Mum by my lovely Uncle Joe in 1956. Uncle Joe was at that time the organist of the Baptist Church in Irvine, who taught me the "rudiments of music"! He was a qualified music teacher, but not as an "examiner". I therefore never sat any examinations in music. Although regretting this, "never say never"!

More recent editions of certain Hymn Books still in circulation are "Mission Praise" and "Songs of Fellowship", which some readers may already know of, or even possess.

In the Methodist Church of which I'm a member here in Morriston (and by the way, the current church organist), we had at the time of my arrival in 1970, "The Methodist Hymn Book", published in the year 1933. This was followed by "Hymns and Psalms" in 1984. The latest hymn book we're using is "Singing the Faith", published in 2011. I just love the "new tunes" and "new words" throughout this recent hymn book, e.g. Scottish Tunes, i.e. "The Eriskay Love Lilt", "The Skye Boat Song", "Ye Banks and Braes", and "Kelvingrove" to name but a few! As a Scots Lass, I'm naturally biased!



Nowadays, overhead screens are seen in many churches – not ours as yet! Hence no hymn books are needed – just look up!

Let me finish this account by mentioning that my "all time favourite" hymn book has to be "The Billy Graham Song Book" compiled by Cliff Barrows for the "All-Scotland Dr. Billy Graham Crusade" in Glasgow, 1955! I was very privileged to attend two of Dr. Graham's Crusade Meetings in the Kelvin Hall, Glasgow, with my Mum, during his 1955 crusade. What a very far-reaching effect Dr. Graham's Crusades have had all over the World. I'm sure many of you will recall these wonderful, uplifting and challenging meetings, and perhaps have even been present on one or more occasion.

I'd urge you to seek out some of the foregoing hymn books if possible. I'm sure some of them are still in circulation, or obtainable through "Archives".

I'd like to leave you by quoting the lines of the first verse of that awe-inspiring and very challenging words of Dr. Graham's famous "Altar-call hymn":

*Just as I am, without one plea
But that Thy blood was shed for me;
And that Thou bidst me come to Thee.
O Lamb of God, I come, I come!*

My prayer is that we will "answer the call" and give our lives to the One who gave His life for us!

The Methodist Conference



The Conference is the governing body of the Methodist Church under God. It has responsibility for the government, discipline, management and administration of the life of the Church. Members of the Conference hold a trustee responsibility. The Conference is also a place for worship, thanksgiving, ordination and celebration.

The business of the Conference is done by seeking the will of God through conferring together. Members of the Conference are representatives, not delegates.

The 2017 Conference will take place from Thursday 22 June - Thursday 29 June at the Hilton Birmingham Metropole at the National Exhibition Centre, Pendigo Way, Birmingham

The President and Vice-President

Each year at the Methodist Conference, the following year's President (always an ordained presbyter) and Vice-President (always a lay person or deacon) are elected.

John Wesley himself was the original President of the Methodist Conference, but after his death it was agreed that in future, so much authority would not be placed in the hands of one person. Instead, the President would be elected for one year only, to sit in Wesley's chair.

When lay people were admitted to the Conference in 1878, a lay Vice-President was also elected, and the two now serve in partnership.

The President and Vice-President follow Wesley's example in travelling the length and breadth of Great Britain. They preach widely and contribute articles to the Methodist press, often choosing a particular emphasis or theme for their year. They represent Methodism in the wider world.

Former Presidents and Vice-Presidents often

continue to exercise influence in senior Methodist committees and decision making bodies.

One More Step



It's five years now since a group of us in Clydach received the offer of a shop on the High Street, initially rent free and then on a very reasonable rent, to start an outreach project in the village. This became Ty Croeso, a small cafe-style venue which hosts a variety of activities and services, including branches of the Swansea Foodbank and the Neath Port Talbot Credit Union.

We're currently looking at registering as a charity, a significant step forward for us after very small steps forward and at least one period of uncertainty as to whether we'd be able to continue. We rely on a group of about 20 volunteers (mainly Christians from local churches, but also a few of other faiths/no faith). It costs us around £4,500 per annum to keep going. We've been very fortunate in receiving a number of very good grants lately, but always need to keep checking out new sources, some of whom only give to registered charities.

A new project that attracted a special grant is a seated exercise class. That may sound easy but it's quite a 'workout', strengthening just about every muscle in the body, but accessible to those with, for example, knee problems or MS.



The vocal chords are exercised at the bi-monthly 'Tea and Hymns' sessions which have become popular with the local care home residents and others: last month around 20 residents were brought in by staff from 3 care homes. "Tea and Hymns" involves about half an hour of hymns, sometimes with a reading from Scripture or poetry, and then tea and cakes provided by one or other of the local congregations. It's held in the newly refurbished hall of Capel y Nant, where our small "Wesley" congregation meets on Sunday afternoons. The next one on Wednesday June 14th at 2.15 p.m.: do come and join us!

Thanks to all the groups and individuals who continue to support this small venture. Please pray for us as we continue to take steps forward in service to the Clydach area.

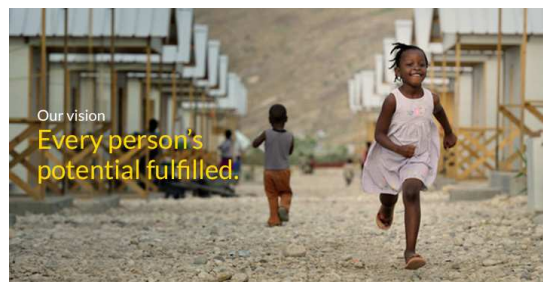

You could continue to think and pray about this nation in this way, committing to support them throughout next year and receiving news and messages every quarter. All We Can have produced a film and resources to inspire you and you could ask for a speaker to visit your church.

The appeal launched in February for the victims of the famine in East Africa raised an amazing £345,000 in two months. This has been used in South Sudan, Yemen, Somalia and Ethiopia to treat those who are already severely malnourished; to distribute nutritional food such as sorghum, beans and cooking oil; and to help prepare communities for future food insecurity. Thank you to those who responded to that appeal.

All We Can (formerly Methodist Relief and Development Fund) is a pioneering international development, relief and advocacy organisation that believes in the power of partnership. Their stated purpose is to help people to find solutions to poverty and become

all that they can, by investing in partnerships that improve quality of life and create positive, long-term change in some of the world's poorest communities.
